Terry Seitz St. Paul's Story

Looking back at my life in 2023 it would appear that I have had a very steady faith journey. I was baptized at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Haysville in 1957; confirmed here in 1971; and attended with my parents and sister when younger. Later, I was joined by my wife, Ann and two daughters, Kristen Ruhe and Lori Werner. After Ann's passing, I was blessed to have my wife, Deena Lewis, as a part of my church family. All this taught me that a journey is not always a straight path and, while where you worship is important, why you worship is far more so.

A few memories:

We had a change in ministers during our confirmation process and the new minister, Ron Deck, gave letter grades for our studies to all confirmation students. The three highest grades were "rewarded" with the requirement that each of us – at age 14 - give a five minute sermon to the congregation on Confirmation Day.

As expressed to the congregation during our 175th Anniversary this year, it was a great deal of fun to attend the 1973 All Lutheran Youth Gathering in Houston, Texas. Dozens of Luther League high schoolers had one memorable adventure in faith.

About this same time, our pastor, Charles Schroeder, held a conversation with me about entering the ministry. I was surprised yet, after thoughtful discussion with my parents and prayer, decided that was not in my future. From time to time, I have wondered what life

would be if I had made a different decision? Later, I did become a lay worship leader and I think of Pastor Schroeder fondly for asking.

I was the youth representative for our 125th Anniversary committee in 1973. I recall not receiving much enthusiasm when I suggested inviting then Indiana Governor Otis Bowen to be a guest speaker at one of our events. He was a Lutheran and I thought hearing insight to his faith would be great. After one meeting, I wrote a letter to the Governor, received an acceptance note in return and welcomed him to St. Paul's later that year.

There have been several major impacts on my faith during my life. First among them is seeing Kristen, Lori, and their families active at St. Paul's. These actions are entirely of their own volition without any demands from me. When Ann was diagnosed with ALS on our 30th wedding anniversary in 2008, it brought change to our entire family. She shielded herself from uncomfortable moments by choosing to not share information about her illness and one way of doing so was not to be in public very often, including worship. I was so happy to have her join me for a Saturday evening service when I led worship in October 2010. Little did we know she would enter Heaven a few weeks later.

For a year and a half following her diagnosis I was a very angry man. Since I wanted to be very supportive and helpful to Ann, I tried to hide my anger and would vent when I was alone. I cursed God for delivering such devastation on her and us. If driving, I pounded the steering wheel and yelled. Many times, I pulled over at the side of the road and cried. Since then, I've learned that others who have loved ones with a terminal illness often do the same thing, which is

experiencing the grieving process before a loved one passes. In time, I accepted what was to happen and for the remaining portion of Ann's life with us, I believe I was a better husband and father. She passed in 2010 on our family's favorite holiday, Thanksgiving. Her final service was at St. Paul's. We are pleased to say Thanksgiving remains our favorite holiday.

Another major event in my faith journey came via my relationship and marriage to Deena. Early in our time together she expressed that her belief in God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit was the focus of her life and that her church home at Central Christian Church in Huntingburg had helped her through many challenging moments, including the loss of her husband, Alex. From my perspective, Deena's faith was, and remains, much stronger than mine. That's one of the reasons I am confident her appearance in my life was a gift from God. We often talk about why our spouses died, but we don't have answers to those questions. Therefore, we have learned not to question why, but to celebrate what our union has provided to us. We pray daily for continued growth in our faith for the rest of our lives.

He received a kidney transplant in December 2021. Jenni Rehrig Hill and her husband Bob have lived in Keller, Texas for 30 years. Jenni is retired from Assistant to the Principal at Keller High School and Bob retired from a long career with General Mills. For the first thirteen years of their marriage, they lived in six different cities before Keller. They have two sons, Andy and Aaron, and two grandchildren.

The 10 years in Haysville were happy ones for the Rehrig family. Pastor and Joanne were highly respected for their personable ways and Joanne's musical talents. She gave pipe organ lessons to several students (Arlene Vonderheide is an example of those students still today). Mark and Jenni fondly remember soda pop and candy from Nigg's store, the school being so close, and the town full of kids to play with.

Mark stated "a kid learns a lot fast when your dad is the pastor - and you're living right next door to Indiana's largest rural Lutheran congregation." When Mark and Jenni were about to start high school, Pastor and Joanne knew it was either leave after ten years or wait at least five more years, so they decided to move on to St. Paul in Louisville. Mark says that although they moved 53 years ago, they have many happy memories of their hometown and the hundreds of St. Paul's members. Some of the memories may now be faded, but they remember a lot of things about St. Paul's and Haysville. Welcome back, Mark! Thank you for joining us today for our Heritage Sunday and to Mark and Jenni for graciously donating items for the time capsule!

Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings at *St. Paul's Lutheran Church of Jasper on Wednesday, July 26, 2023.* A package of four screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.¹

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation

A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²




July Newsletter Story from St. Paul 175th Anniversary Team
