175th Anniversary Heritage Sunday Spotlight

Alice June Harker

January 14, 2023

Alice June (Neukam) Harker was born at home, in Harbinson Township, in Dubois County Indiana, on June 28th, 1935. She was the only child of Philmore Philip Neukam and Irma (Hemmerlein) Neukam. Both parents were born in Dubois County, Indiana.

"June" married Edward L. Harker on November 15, 1955, at St. Paul's Lutheran Church. The officiating pastor was Dr. H.J. Brede.

Edward was a veteran who served in the Allied Peace Keeping Mission, in Germany, at the end of WW II. Edward passed away on January 12, 1995.

Edward and June had two children: Jay Leroy Harker and Julee Marie (Harker) Gruneisen. Jay passed away on December 15, 2018, and is sadly missed. Her daughter, Julee continues to be a joy and a blessing in June's life.

Grandchildren: Kyle Scott Harker, Kristin Alyse Harker and Elise Marie Gruneisen.

Great-grandchildren: Amelia June Harker and Lukas James Harker

Schools attended:

June attended elementary school at Kellerville Grade School and then, graduated from Dubois High School, in Dubois, Indiana.

Employment

June worked for the MeadowGold Dairy office, until her first child, Jay, was born. Then she dedicated her time to being a mother and co-director of their farm.

Christmas Day, 1946

On Christmas morning, 1946, June and her family were preparing to go to St. Paul's for Christmas Service. Her Grandmother Neukam answered an 8:00 A.M. phone call. It was the exchange operator with one message: "The Church is on fire! Everybody in!!"

This message filled the family with shock and disbelief. Irma (June's mother), called her husband who was working outdoors, and they prepared to drive to the church and help in any way they could.

The fire had started in the attic. The men rushed into the sanctuary and ripped up as many pews as they could, and the women carried them out.

June's dad (Philmore), told her mother to go to the altar because the Communion wine had already been poured. A difficult decision had to be made about what to do with the wine, as it had already been blessed. Philmore decided that it had to be thrown on the floor of the church.

After June's parents returned home that day, Philmore had to go back to the church because the men were meeting to decide what they would do next. June's Grandpa Neukam exclaimed, in German, "Bau es Zuruck"....

"Build it back!"

The decision to do just that was made that very afternoon.

The next Sunday, church services were held in the schoolhouse. Before their trip to St. Paul's for the service, June's parents prepared her for the terrible sight she would see there.

The bell in the bell tower of the church had fallen during the fire and was broken in half. June's Grandpa Neukam and his brother Henry immediately decided to furnish a new bell for the church. The bell would continue to ring the cadence of "come one, come all", as it always had.

The stained-glass window behind the altar of our present-day church, was a duplicate of what had been in the church that burned.

The members of St. Paul's stuck together and built a beautiful new church, "out of the ashes."

St. Paul's Confirmation Class of 1947-1949

After the fire, the confirmation class of 1947, was held in Christ Lutheran Church in Haysville. The members of Christ Lutheran had extended an invitation for that class to continue in their church.

June's confirmation class continued from 1947-1949. Pastor Boening had told the class, "No more! The next confirmation will be held in the new church."

Therefore, the children of this class attended instruction for two years.

June had a deep respect and admiration for Pastor Boening. He was kind but very thorough in the instruction of his children. He taught the class in English, although his own English was "broken".

"Questioning Day" for the class was held on Palm Sunday.

There were 100 questions about the Lutheran Faith that the class had to answer (at random) during the church service.

June's mother drilled her on the questions, and she was still studying in the car, on the way to the church. When they arrived, Pastor Boening addressed the class. He said, "Children, I have misplaced my list. Therefore, I will ask you questions, off the top of my head." That caused quite a stir among the class members!

The class was confirmed on Easter Sunday 1949, when the new church was dedicated.

Pastor Boening insisted that the class wear robes, in that all should be alike and equal. The Pastor also asked the parents of the class members to provide the curtain that hung behind the church alter.

It was a beautiful memory for June to walk into the new church with her confirmation classmates on that Easter Sunday morning.

Pastor Boening wrote a song for the class, entitled, "This is the Day My Lord Thy God has Made". The children of the class sang their special song that day.

St. Paul's Church Picnic

St. Paul's Church Picnic was a grand event in which was the church members and surrounding communities all anticipated. Also, a project which required a lot of hard work from all.

This is June's account of her memories of the church picnic, as a child:

The picnic was held at Munch Grove. Before the picnic, devotions were held in front of the church at 9:00 A.M. Then everyone proceeded to the picnic grounds.

The children received two free coupons for ice cream, from Sunday School superintendent Harry Baker, upon arriving at the grounds. Moving around

to the right, they found the German Band. "Oom-pa-pa, Oom-pa-pa", was heard all through the day.

Then there was the Cane Toss. If you were able to throw the ring around the cane handle, you won the cane. Next, there was a hamburger and hot dog stand and a fishpond.

There were cookstoves in which chicken was fried by the women. They started cooking early in the morning.

Lastly, the big tent in which bingo and games were played. The last event of the day was "cover all" bingo. The prize for the top three winners of this game each received a handmade quilt, crafted by one of the women of the church. Then the picnic was over.

Many people attended the picnic and enjoyed their dinners there. The two churches who were sure to reciprocate attendance to each other's picnics were St. Paul's Lutheran and St. Raphael's Catholic Churches of Dubois.

The picnics stopped during WW II. It was not possible to provide what was needed for the event to be held because of the rationing of food and many other commodities (especially sugar), during the war.

Luther League

Children were not allowed to participate in the Luther League or choir until after they were confirmed.

June enjoyed her time in Luther League very much. There were probably 25-30 people attending on a usual basis. The Luther League members went to meetings until they were married. It was fun and June was sad when it was time for her to stop attending.

She met her husband at Luther League at a Halloween party.

Part of the fun of being part of the choir was afterward when someone would suggest they go to Schellville to the dance. Those were good times for all.

Memories of an Era

June remembers exactly when the United States was compelled to enter WW II.

She was six years old and she and her parents were driving home from practice for the church Christmas program. The day was December 7, 1941. Jun's dad said, "I think that something bad happened today. Others were talking about some kind of attack."

They went home and turned on the battery powered transistor radio, to learn that the Japanese had bombed Pearl Harbor. Hawaii was not yet a state but was a territory of the United States. At that point in time, everything changed for all the citizens of the United States.

How the Church has Changed Over the Years

Church was, during that time, not only a place of worship, but a social place. Because there were few activities in which young people could participate, their place to meet and socialize with friends was at church. The church recognized their men and women serving the military with their prayers and by displaying a banner at the right side of the alter, listing all those members who were serving in the military. If there was a gold star beside a name on the banner, that indicated that the soldier had sacrificed his or her life for their country.

Alice June (Neukam) Harker had so many positive memories, growing up in St. Paul's Lutheran Church. She had the love and support of friends and family. She had respect and admiration for her mentor, Pastor E.H. Boeing. Her story is an inspiration to all of the members of St. Paul's today.
